Connecting faith, family & friends

FIRST READING: Genesis 29.15-28

Laban said to Jacob, 'Because you are my kinsman, should you therefore serve me for nothing? Tell me, what shall your wages be?' Now Laban had two daughters; the name of the elder was Leah, and the name of the younger was Rachel. Leah's eyes were lovely, and Rachel was graceful and beautiful. Jacob loved Rachel; so he said, 'I will serve you seven years for your younger daughter Rachel.' Laban said, 'It is better that I give her to you than that I should give her to any other man; stay with me.' So Jacob served seven years for Rachel, and they seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her. Then Jacob said to Laban, 'Give me my wife that I may go in to her, for my time is completed.' So Laban gathered together all the people of the place, and made a feast. But in the evening he took his daughter Leah and brought her to Jacob; and he went in to her. (Laban gave his maid Zilpah to his daughter Leah to be her maid.) When morning came, it was Leah! And Jacob said to Laban, 'What is this you have done to me?' Did I not serve with you for Rachel? Why then have you deceived me?' Laban said, 'This is not done in our country—giving the younger before the firstborn. Complete the week of this one, and we will give you the other also in return for serving me for another seven years.' Jacob did so, and completed her week; then Laban gave him his daughter Rachel as a wife.

Commentary: This continues the story of Jacob on his arrival in Haran where he has just met one of his future wives, Rachel, at the well. He meets his uncle Laban and stays with him a month before the subject of wages arises. When Jacob finally gets to marry Rachel he finds that she is barren and Leah her sister continues to produce offspring for Jacob - four in all. Because Rachel was unable to bear children she gave her maid, Bilhah to Jacob who bore him a son named Dan. More sons are born to Jacob through the maids of Leah and Rachel, and two more sons by Leah. The final child by Leah is a daughter called Dinah. After this God remembers Rachel and she finally bears a son to Jacob named Joseph. These children born from Rachel, Leah and their maids become the patriarchs of eleven of the tribes of Israel. Benjamin is born later. The focus of the story moves back to further deceptions of Jacob and Laban. Laban insists that Jacob continue to work for him in order for him to marriage Rachel, the woman he initially wanted to wed.

Psalm 105.1-11, 45

O give thanks to the Beloved, and open your hearts to Love.

Awaken! Listen in silence for the Voice of the Counselor.

Sing praises with a glad heart and give witness to the truth with your lives!

Glory in the radiance of the Beloved; let the hearts of those who call upon You rejoice!

Seek the One who is Life, your strength, walk harmoniously in Love's Presence!

Remember that you are not alone, for through Love doubt and fear are released;

O people of the earth, ever bear in mind the unity of diversity in the Divine Plan!

You are the Promise of our wholeness,
You await our readiness to choose Life.

Your covenant of Love stands firm through all ages;
You forgive us when we stray far from Home.

Help us to learn to trust You, to untangle the webs of illusion that we have made.

As we sift through our dreams, guide us to the only Dream that brings peace – knowing we belong to You.

Give us wisdom and courage to release all that binds us;
for, to let go of what is built on illusion is to find new life.

SECOND READING: Romans 8.26-39

Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, 'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Commentary: In this chapter Paul describes the life of the Christian as a life of freedom immersed in the goodness of God. This gives us a confidence that is strengthened by the knowledge of what God has done, and will do in Christ. The two rhetorical questions at the heart this passage receive the unexpressed answer 'Nobody' because the whole of our lives is in the hand of God, through Christ. The closing list of human experiences is certainly one familiar to the martyrs and confessors of all ages and stands as a reminder to us that nothing can touch the reality of God's love for each and every one of his children.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13.44-58

'The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. 'Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it. 'Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. 'Have you understood all this?' They answered, 'Yes.' And he said to them, 'Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.' When Jesus had finished these parables, he left that place. He came to his home town and began to teach the people in their synagogue, so that they were astounded and said, 'Where did this man get this wisdom and these deeds of power? Is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary? And are not his brothers James and Joseph and Simon and Judas? And are not all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all this?' And they took offence at him. But Jesus said to them, 'Prophets are not without honour except in their own country and in their own house.' And he did not do many deeds of power there, because of their unbelief.

Commentary: These three parables belong together and make the same point: the total commitment demanded by the Gospel. To buy a field, the man in the first parable has to sell everything: he was therefore a poor man and probably working as a labourer. If he found treasure, he was obliged to report it to his master, the field's owner. Instead he sells everything and buys the field. The merchant in the second parable was a richer man, passing through Galilee on his way from the pearl fishing seas on the east. Still, he sells all that he had and bought it. The final parable is a reminder that we should not get caught up in sorting out the good from the bad in this life by forming sects of pious people: all the sorting will be done by God's at the judgment.

FAIRTRADE AND LOCAL SUPPLIERS...

Parish Council have restated their commitment to buy local and/or fair trade supplies for the parish (unless costs are unreasonable). Therefore, we have coffee and tea sourced ethically (from Fair Trade suppliers); our toilet paper, paper towels and tissues are supplied by a company that not only sources ethically sustained materials but send 50% of profits to developing countries to provide toilets and hygiene supplies (from Who Gives a Crap); and we are in the process of sourcing some local made



biscuits for morning tea (with the assistance of Diana from Tuckers Natural) as well as some local hand sanitiser and cleaning products made in the Adelaide Hills by an indigenous company called NOOD Australia.

COVID CLEANING


